#### **Dawn Bacon**

Dawn F. Bacon is the Elementary Director of Instruction for Lunenburg County Public Schools. She is a graduate of Longwood University, with a Masters of Education in Curriculum and Instruction and Administration. In addition, Mrs. Bacon is currently serving as the Region 8 Professional Development Council Chairperson. 


#### **Shikee Franklin**

#### **Donna McConnell**


