**SUBJECT: Preparation for Teaching Careers** 

The Education and Training Career Cluster prepares high school students for teaching careers that serve individuals of all ages and across a range of content and specializations. To address the growing teacher shortage in Virginia, school divisions are encouraged to offer <u>Virginia Teachers for Tomorrow</u> and <u>Early Childhood, Education, and Services</u> programs of study. Students will have an opportunity to participate in work-based learning experiences, dual enrollment, earn credentials such as the <u>ParaPro</u> or <u>Praxis</u>, and develop leadership skills through participation in the student organization, <u>Educators Rising</u>.

By 2022, a number of teachers are expected to retire, leading to a rise in job prospects for educators. The increased emphasis on early childhood education is driving the demand for preschool and middle school teachers. A shortage of qualified teachers for career and technical education provides opportunities for career switchers, as well as teachers from traditional college programs.
